THE LANTERNS

The Shorncliffe Trust produce the Lanterns and they honour the fallen and symbolically shine a light on those who sacrificed their lives during WWI and WWII.

The lantern is the classic Eccles Miners' Lantern and due to design features, is safe within buildings and to transport across land, sea and air. Further information about Shorncliffe and the lanterns can be found at: www.shorncliffe-trust.org.uk

RAF Lantern ROGER was named and blessed here on 31st October 2021. ROGER shines his light at Shorncliffe in remembrance of RAF airmen who lost their lives in wartime, together with Navy Lantern JACK and Army Lantern TOMMY.

The West Indian Military Association Lantern is named MARY, and members of the Association are here today.

ROGER is brought here for our special services, and will escort our new Lantern into the Chapel, together with JACK and MARY. ROGER's light will be shared with GEORGE and the congregation will be invited to light their own votive candles to join with their light.

The inscription on GEORGE's brass plaque is:

GEORGE was gifted to the Chapel by the Friends of St George's Chapel. He will be on display in a glass cabinet above the Remembrance Garden Books. At times, GEORGE may visit other venues, where Lanterns are spreading their light.

The collection today is for the Friends of St George's Chapel towards the upkeep of the Chapel.

Please stand for procession of Reverend Diana Coutts-Pauling followed by the Standard of the RAF Regiment, the Banner of 2427 (Biggin Hill) Squadron Air Training Corps and the Lantern Bearers.

For all the saints who from their labours rest, who thee by faith before the world confessed thy name, O Jesu, be forever blest.

Chaplain: We have gathered here today on St George's Day, to remember the Patron Saint of this Chapel, and to witness the lighting, blessing and naming of this Royal Air Force Lantern GEORGE, and to keep it as a symbol of Light in the Darkest Hours.

Reverend Diana lights a large votive candle from ROGER and gives light to our new lantern, names and blesses it GEORGE. George is then returned the table.

The Congregation is invited to light a votive candle from the taper and share their light uniting with the flames of the lanterns.

Chaplain: We are also here today to give thanks to Almighty God for this Royal Air Force Chapel of Remembrance dedicated to St George and to remember with gratitude its founders and benefactors.

We remember those who have worshipped here over the years and thank God for its living witness to the Risen Christ. Let us remember the presence of God and make our humble confession before him.

Chaplain: May the Father of all mercies cleanse us from our sins and restore us in his image to the praise and glory of his name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Please sit

2 Timothy 2: vv 3-13

read by Mr Paul Grant, Chairman of the Friends of St George's Chapel

Join with me in suffering, like a good soldier of Christ Jesus. No one serving as a soldier gets entangled in civilian affairs, but rather tries to please his commanding officer. Similarly, anyone who competes as an athlete does not receive the victor's crown except by competing according to the rules. The hardworking farmer should be the first to receive a share of the crops. Reflect on what I am saying, for the Lord will give you insight into all this. Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, descended from David. This is my gospel, for which I am suffering even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But God's word is not chained. Therefore, I endure everything for the sake of the elect, that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. Here is a trustworthy saying: If we died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him. If we disown him, he will also disown us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful, for he cannot disown himself.

The Front Cover Picture

St George's window, in St George's Room which was part of the Chapel, commemorates the 40th anniversary of the Battle of Britain. It depicts St George overcoming the mythical dragon of evil. In the sky above are two British aircraft, a Spitfire and Hurricane and an enemy aircraft going down in a trail of smoke.

The Friends of St George's Chapel

St. George's RAF Chapel is both a memorial to the aircrew who gave their lives flying from the Biggin Hill Sector in WWII and a place of worship. The Friends group was set up in 1991 as the Royal Air Force was about to close RAF Biggin Hill. As the Chapel did not have a parish in the normal sense, it was thought that some people who, although unable to worship regularly here, consider the Chapel special and would like to retain a close association with it, thus helping to ensure that it continued to be a living Chapel with services.

Church of England services are held each Sunday at 9.30am. Special Sunday services for Battle of Britain, Remembrance and The Friends of St George's Chapel and several others also take place. See our website.

Since the RAF relinquished responsibility for the site, and the Museum was built, the FSGC group has been responsible for the maintenance of the roses and grass in the consecrated Remembrance Garden, for the internal fabric of the Chapel, such as candles, communion wafers, wine, flowers, cleaning of Chapel and washroom, payments for organists and ministers as appropriate, and the Spitfire and Hurricane Gate Guardians.
